


- 150,000 pop.

- Significant homeless situation




- Housing Development
 - > Affordable housing capital subsidies
- Public Housing Agency
 - > Rental assistance (e.g., Section 8, VASH, EHV)
- Homeless Continuum of Care
 - > Homeless services planning and funding
 - > Federal, state, county, city funding sources

- Existing 2-story office building owned by Salvation Army to be demolished and replaced with a state-of-the-art food pantry.
- New 4-story mixed-used building developed, owned and operated by The Salvation Army
- State-of-the-art food pantry
- 65 permanent supportive housing units for homeless adults including 16 for homeless veterans, plus 1 manager's unit





Helpful State Measures

- Project HomeKey
 - > No longer funded
- Permanent Local Housing Allocation (PLHA)
 - > Great flexibility
 - > Only 25% of old redevelopment housing set aside
- Block granting of state homeless funds (e.g., HHAP)
 - > One time only



- Lack of capital funding for new development
- PBV cap needs to be raised
- Lack of long-term funding
 - > More PLHA
